- Author
- Title/Source
- Publication info

# Typical Works Cited Entry

Salinger, John. *The Catcher in the Rye*. Boston:  
Little, Brown and Company, 1951.

If you followed this with another Salinger novel,  
it would look like this...

---. *Franny and Zooey*. New York: Harper Row,  
1954.

If there is no author, use the first item listed on the Works Cited page.

### Works Cited

“Future Looks Dim for Students.” *USA Today*  
2 June 1983: 3A.

### Sentence in Essay

“In 2009, 40% more students were attempting to gain admission to a college pool that had not increased since the 60’s” (“Future Looks Dim” 3A).

# What is the difference between a Works Cited and a Bibliography?

- A “Works Cited” page lists only those works you *cited*.

(An additional “Works Consulted” page can be included to note the works you read but didn’t directly refer to in your essay.)

- A “Bibliography” includes both works cited and works consulted.

# Summary...

- Center “Works Cited” at the top of the page and double space all entries cited in your essay.
- Indent the second line 5 spaces.
- Entries should be listed in ABC order.
- When you use two works by the same author, use the “---.” for the author’s name for each subsequent work.
- What you put in the ( ) must be the first item listed in the entry on your works cited.

- Specific examples of how to cite sources on the Works Cited page are in your packet—or you can use EASY BIB—cuz it's easy!
