- Grew up in rural Kentucky
- Early influences: the Bookmobile, a large garden, the surrounding fields & woods, & parents who were tolerant of nature but intolerant of TV.
- Graduated with a degree in biology

- Moved to Tucson pursued graduate studies in evolutionary biology at the University of Arizona
- After graduate school she was a scientific writer before becoming a freelance journalist.
- She wrote The Bean Trees while suffering from insomnia during pregnancy.

- * Widespread critical acclaim and word-of-mouth support have kept the book in print, adopted into the core curriculum of high school and college literature classes across the U.S., & translated into more than a dozen languages.
- Other novels <u>Animal Dreams</u>, <u>Pigs in Heaven</u>, <u>The Poisonwood Bible</u>, and <u>Prodigal Summer</u>

- She established the Bellwether Prize, awarded to a first novel that uses literature as a tool for change.

TEACH A NONFICTION ESSAY

GROUP PRESENTATION

To explore the many social issues raised in the novel.

- You will present the article (5 min.) and lead a class discussion (5 min.)
- * You must have at least 5 thought provoking discussion questions. You can stray from this list during discussion if you'd like, but you need these 5 questions prepared before your discussion and a copy for Ms. F.

* As a group, you will teach your essay to the rest of the class. Your presentation should include a brief article summary (no more than 2 minutes) and the American themes presented in the article.

Absences:

- * If you are gone the day your group presents, you should write a response answering your group's discussion questions (1 page).
- However, you will not be able to make up the discussion points.

DISCUSSION POINTS

- When you are not presenting, you must participate in discussion.
- There are five points available for your participation over the two days of presentations.
- * If you respond at least three quality times during discussions, you will get 5 points. If you respond twice you will get 3 points. And, if you respond once you will get 2 points.

Point Breakdown:

Presentation (10 points)

Did the group present for the full 10 minutes? Was there a strong command of the article and the concepts/themes present in the article? Was the discussion strong, interesting, and engaging?

Discussion Questions (5 points)

Are there at least 5 thought provoking discussion questions?

Discussion (5 points)

Did student respond 3 times? 2 times? 1 time?
